## Nature After Minerals: East of England regional event

Over Community Centre, Over, Cambridgeshire, 5-6 December 2007

### Event aims:

- To introduce the Nature After Minerals programme and the importance of Mineral Development Frameworks (MDFs) for wildlife.
- To present case studies of successful habitat creation on mineral sites in the East of England region.
- To highlight innovative approaches to delivering habitat creation through MDFs from across England.
- To provide a focus for discussion about local opportunities and overcoming obstacles.
- To bring together stakeholders in the MDF process from across the East of England region.
- To give first-hand experience of habitat created on mineral sites at the Hanson-RSPB Wetland Project, Needingworth Quarry.

This event could contribute to attendees' **Continuing Professional Development (CPD)**. Certificates of attendance will be provided showing areas of professional development covered and the duration of the event.

### Expected professional development outcomes:

- Increased understanding of the important role MDFs can play in helping wildlife, contributing to Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP) targets and benefiting local communities.
- An understanding of the types of habitats that can be created on mineral sites, and sources of further information.
- Increased understanding of potential blocks to habitat creation on mineral sites and solutions for overcoming these.
- Discussion about integrating other end-use demands with biodiversity (such as geological conservation, public access and education).
- Discussion about local opportunities for large-scale habitat creation through mineral planning.
- First-hand experience of habitat created on mineral sites.
- Contact with a range of important stakeholders.

**Key audiences:** mineral planners, restoration or estates managers from industry, statutory consultees on MDFs such as Environment Agency and Natural England, non-governmental organisations with an interest in MDFs and biodiversity.
